

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well we would..yes, we would, if we desire to change it at some point during the year, yes, we could call ourselves into special session to change that.

SENATOR CARPENTER: We'd automatically have to if the revenues were not sufficient in order to do what we had to do.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I'd presume that we would, yes.

SENATOR CARPENTER: OK. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: I just want to pursue this too..I thought we were on Warner's amendment but since we got on Cavanaugh's amendment, I want to ask Senator Cavanaugh a question.

PRESIDENT: Well, all right.

SENATOR SYAS: Have you ever known or heard of in the last twenty some years, at least, where this Legislature has ever by 33 votes called themselves into special session?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I haven't been around for 23 years.

SENATOR SYAS: Well I know that but have you even ever heard of it?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: No, I haven't.

SENATOR SYAS: Do you think it is likely we would do so?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I would think we would if the situation required it.

SENATOR SYAS: I don't think we would. I will tell you, past history shows we wouldn't. It takes the Governor to call a special session, if you want to know a master at trying to call special sessions, ask Senator Carpenter how many times he tried and failed.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well I am sure the Governor would, in this case, probably call a special session if the situation required it.

SENATOR SYAS: Well you answered that...that isn't the question you answered, Senator. You said, the Legislature would call themselves into a special session. We have the constitutional right to do it but we don't do it. Thank God for that. Let the Governor call us in special session.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Whitney.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Thanks for answering my question.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, I would like to know if it is the Warner amendment now that's before the house. Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: We are attempting, yes, to keep the Warner amendment #2 before the house. The other has a relation to it and it is terribly difficult as a presiding officer to say where can you stop the discussion on this. You have to have full discussion of the question but we are discussing the Warner amendment, yes, Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Yes. Well now I'd like to speak then to the Warner amendment. I want to approve of it. We had the
