legislature, I am neither interested in drawing blood from Senator Chambers nor in donating blood to Senator Chambers. I think his motion is well placed. I think it is timely and even though this is the tail end of the session, I would be hopeful that there are enough people in this legislature who recognize the truth of the words he spoke and will vote a, for a measure for a procedural step which I hope will lead to the passage of a measure which is as needed and as necessary as any single piece of legislation which we have dealt with during this session.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion now of the motion? Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I much impressed by first Senator Kelly, and certainly by Senator Fellman and I would read into his suggestion that it might have the approval of the Governor and for that reason I support it also.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the motion? Senator Fellman, did you want to be recognized?

SENATOR FELLMAN: I was reading, Mr. President, members of the legislature, I was carefully reading the rules this morning during one of the very long periods and I noticed that a person has the right to speak twice on a bill and is limited only a, by a 10 minute speech. I would like to exercise the first portion of that rule and speak twice on this measure. I must confess that I am honored by the very unique position that the good Senator from Scottsbluff seems to have put me in. I, a few days ago, he accused me of being a 4 horse, one of the 4 horsemen, that was really before my time. I've read about it. Someone else has accused me jokingly of having a secret meeting every Monday morning with Governor Exon and one member of the legislative body wanted to know if he could join that secret meeting and I was about to tell him yes, but I thought it was really unfair to whoever watches the door at the Governor's mansion, to have somebody over there knocking at 6:30 on Monday morning. Senator Carpenter, I would like to tell you that as a person voting for this bill, I would welcome your vote. I have neither been fearful of you, I have been respectful of your opinions when we've agreed with them. I agree with your conclusion and think that someone ought to point out to this legislative body, that the last time I spoke or talked with Governor Exon, was a week or 10 days ago. I'm not quite sure what we talked about. He might remember, but I doubt that he would. I intend to vote for this bill if it is vetoed, I intend to vote for the over ride. I think it is a necessary bill. I think this is a good place to point out to the members of the legislature that we should be voting for legislation that we think is good and what the Governor decides, what he thinks. The last decision is ours and on this bill I've clearly stated my point of view. I hope I haven't lost a vote for the bill.

PRESIDENT: Now, any further discussion of the motion? Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well along the same line of thought, I used to be a part of these weekly meetings which we were briefed and had a sense of direction. Since I am not in that category any longer, it was my assumption maybe wrongly so, that Senator Fellman took my position. So I only did him the honor, I presume that because he was for it, he generally is for those things that the Governor wants and I used to be too, and I am glad somebody very capable of taken my place.
