

away with the agriculture school at Curtis and move them part or whole into this area. We have never had that idea. And for that reason, I certainly have no objection to Senator Lewis's amendment, I hope you adopt his amendment to my motion.

PRESIDENT: Speaking now on the amendment to Senator Carpenters amendment. Senator Chambers and then Senator Kennedy. Not the amendment, thank you, Senator Kennedy we are speaking on the amendment. Anybody to speak on the amendment. Question is then, Senator Stromer.

SENATOR STROMER: Senator Lewis and Senator Carpenter, both, would you find it objectionable to maybe also add language to say that we do not do anything at Hiram Scott that duplicates any effort of any other institution of higher education in Nebraska, which not only would include Curtis but would include any area?

SENATOR CARPENTER: I would say on the motion, if I intervene here, the motion says no degree granting course instruction shall be offered at such property. Wouldn't that cover it? That is in the motion. Now let me again be plain and let me be honest and truthful to you. The Hiram Scott has no desire and no intent to get involved with any subject that the normal schools are now teaching and probably will teach the University or anyone else, this is a peculiar possibility of its own. The only thing we want to do out there if this Legislature someday will go along with it is two things to attempt to teach rural health and rural community services and those things which are affiliated in the area of rural health. The other thing, we want to attempt to tie to the experieent farm in Mitchell is a joint operation in order to upgrade the research in the field of agriculture. That is all that we ever wanted to do. We never wanted to do anything else, and I think that this motion on the desk Senator would answer your question that we can't give a degree without a degree we can't do what you are objecting to.

PRESIDENT: Senator Skarda, do you want to be heard on the amendment. All we are speaking on is the....

SENATOR SKARDA: No, after you get done conducting that business, I would like to say a word of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: O.K. thank you, Senator Stull. Speaking on just the Richard Lewis amendment now here to the Carpenter amendment. Is there any further discussion to the Lewis amendment. Do you all understand the amendment. Alright, then Senator Lewis, you may close on your amendment to the Carpenter motion. Senator Lewis is now closing.

SENATOR R. LEWIS: Well Mr. President, I have no further remarks to make here, I have talked this over with Senator Carpenter and I know that it has been discussed by the Chamber of Commerce in Scottsbluff and also President Varner has had some discussion on this, about moving at least part of the program at the Ag Tech School in Curtis to a school at Scottsbluff if one is started there. Now this program at Curtis is one of the most successfull in of the agriculturally programs in the entire state in my opinion. There success record is very, very good. Their job placement and the success of the students, I think it is a real going thing and I would hate to see it interrupted in any way, so I would move adoption of this amendment.
