SPEAKER: Your asking unanimous consent. He's asking unanimous consent to bracket LB127 to January 21st. Are there any objections. If not, if so ordered. LB131. This is Senator Snyder's bill.

CLERK: Read LB131

SPEAKER: I believe the proper procedure here Mr. Clerk would be if Senator Snyder would like to make a short statement as to the bill. Unless..unless Senator Waldron you want to hold this over.

SENATOR WALDRON: Let Senator Snyder take the committee amendments too. He, I think is familiar with those.

SPEAKER: Senator Snyder will explain the committee amendments.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. Speaker members of the Legislature. I have to quickly review the amendments myself. I don't believe they drastically effect the bill. And I don't believe they are offensive to me. So I would move the adoption of the committee amendments.

SPEAKER: Senator Waldron.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. What the committee amendments do is that..just to clarify the bill. What were trying to do here is as Senator Snyder knows is take away where you get sort of a..the state you know pays when now.. where there is a greater Indian population within the prison. The state pays a certain amount for the boarding these prisoners in these certain counties where they have a high Indian population due to reservations. Where the committee amendment takes the word Indian prisoners out of there and allows the payment of any county where this type of influx of people on federal lands and allows any county to be reimbursed over \$9,000 any thing over \$9,000 the state would pay for the boarding of prisoners in certain counties. That's primarily where there would be Indian reservations.

SPEAKER: Senator Richendifer

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Mr. Speaker members of the Legislature. If there are no objections to the committee amendments, I have nothing to say. The bill was originally enacted in 1957 or 8 and amended 1960. It was needed then, and it's still needed.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion of the committee amendments. Are you ready for the question. The question is to adopt the committee amendments. All those in favor say aye..those. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed no. Motion is carried and amendment is adopted. Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President, with the adoption of the amendments Mr. President with the adoption of the amendments, I'll move for the (INAUDIBLE)
