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wishes of the business men in the cities of this state. Because agricultures also dependent on business. And therefore, we should simply leave that thing alone and try to get along with federal government wants to do which will represent trying to take care of our fuel crisis which is real.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Rasmussen. And then Senator Maresh.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Mr. Chairman and members of the body. I'm going to support this motion. I'm from out state and I think that this would be one time we'll find out whether the eastern people, and I sometimes wonder amongst ourselves we have a hard time getting along. But I'd ask for a record vote on this to see how everybody stands.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Maresh.
A record vote then has been asked.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I to support the motion make by Senator Waldron. I would like to call your attention to the letter we received this morning from the Nebraska State Grange of the state. At this time I wish to advise you on the position of the Grange regarding the daylight savings time issue. We fully support many of the fuel conservation efforts and realize agriculture interests and all rural Nebraska residents will have to make adjustments in their business operations and their way of living. Our members living in the Lincoln and Omaha areas, as well as all Lincoln and Omaha residents, are ready to do their part to conserve energy. However, we are opposed to putting Nebraska on daylight savings time. We urge you to support a resolution putting our state in the mountain time zone for the following reasons.

1. Very little or no fuel will be saved during the winter and early spring months in the middle states of our country. It would cause many of our school children to arrive at school in total darkness. Farmers and ranchers still do most of their livestock farm work in daylight, and are not equipped to do large part of it in the dark.
4. Many other businesses are in the same position as agriculture. The Lincoln and Omaha Chamber of Commerce and others who support daylight savings time say the schools and others cannot begin one hour later. Pardon me. And others can begin one hour later. These things supported say they cannot be one hour behind Chicago, and two hours behind the east coast without hurting their business. The same principal applies to the school employees and agri-business people who must serve the farmers and ranches. Again we ask for your support to use the option that Nebraska has available in this matter. Signed Sincerely, Ed Anderson, Master of the Nebraska State Grange.

PRESIDENT: The chair next recognizes Senator Keyes. Still speaking on the motion. Senator Waldron's motion.

SENATOR KEYES: Well, Mr. President and fellow Senators, I'm going to bring just a little bit of different light to this. When Congress passed and gave us the option of going on what I call daylight savings time by using the latitude marks of this earth of ours which is divided into twenty-four segments. They didn't do nothing but just try to set us back an hour. But if they really want to add more daylight, they'll use the longitude, or the latitude which comes and says that 8:00 in the morning will come in the daylight hours instead of going the other way. You see the sun goes south in the winter time and it comes back north in the summer time. And if we want to
