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as soon as something happens that doesn't meet the satisfaction of a member he puts in a rule change and the first thing we know we're more involved with changing the rules each as the first order of business as we are sometimes as getting to the business at hand. So I'm not trying to be cute with this. I really think that 49 people in the Legislature could agree to the rules at the beginning of the session and then live those rules throughout that particular session. Then you have 6 or 8 months during the interim, if you want to change something you certainly have plenty of time to give to Senator Duis and his Rules Committee. So I would that the Legislature would really bind itself by adopting this motion to where it would take instead of three fifths of the body to make a rules change that it would take four fifths of 40 of the 49 to change a rule. So when we adopt the rules of the game at the beginning of the session we live with them and stop this thing of having playground rules where we change every day. And I would second the motion, I think the motion has been made by Senator Duis. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Simpson and then Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. In reading over this rule change it seems to me that we have two separate issues in here which should be divided and voted on. One in adopting the rules by four fifths majority and the other whether suspending them by a four fifth majority. It seems like two separate issues to me. And then one other comment on it. We're talking down to the next to last sentence about rule changes being proposed within the first ten legislative days in the session. I would think that rule changes could be proposed anytime. But we might to wish only to adopt them during the first ten days of the session. This change is to adoption. Later in the session there might be something proposed which could be looked at and held over and brought in in the first ten days of the next session. If we didn't put it somewhere on paper the idea might be forgotten and it may be a good idea. We should be able to propose it but not possibly adopt it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simpson just for clarification from the chair. Are you suggesting that the question be divided.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Yes I'm asking for a division of the question on the first two issues. Yes.

PRESIDENT: All right, and the chair I think would concur on that. Senator Snyder do you concur also that the question could be divided.

SENATOR SNYDER: I find it a favorable amendment. I had also divided the question.

PRESIDENT: All right that being the case then let's divide the question here that we will
