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of the budget bill, because of the budgeting committee being out, or the second question is, when will we start having half-days and hearings in the afternoons? I think that there are some bills that have been introduced but I don't think that they have been assigned yet. I would just like to get someone, or an idea as to what the plan is. As I say I am not objecting to Senator Marvel having his committee out, but it does have its problems.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Well Senator Syas I think the game plan has to be to live one day at a time around here. I know that it would be nice to lay this all out on a calendar that we are not going to meet certain afternoons. I am afraid at the moment that that is almost impossible. I doubt very much that we should meet this afternoon due to the fact that several committees are going to be out, aren't they Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: At least a couple.

SENATOR PROUD: A further fact exists that we have a number of new bills dropped into the hopper yesterday and more today and I am sure that all of you will thoroughly want to study those pieces of legislation. AT least you will want to look at them and you can't very well do it while we are active on the floor. So I feel that there are going to be times here when we...it would be inadvisable to meet in the afternoon, but exactly what those are I can not say in advance because of various committee chairmen will be setting committee hearings. I don't know just exactly what the bill flow will be, and I'm sorry that I can not more specifically answer the question. But I think that we are going to have to be prepared at times to adjourn in the afternoons.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, members of the legislature, I also want to alert the body that the fact that the Judiciary Committee will be having hearings both executive and public hearings within the next 6 legislative days we will have about 4 or 5 hearings also or at least executive board sessions. So it will as Senator Proud says, we will probably have to play this by ear, otherwise we are going to be in trouble.

PRESIDENT: Very good. Senator Nore, for what purpose do you want to be recognized.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President to point a personal privilege concerning the fiscal analyst. I think that we should probably address our constituents that they have a problem that they come to their senator and we can send them down to the fiscal analyst which we have them down there for and to get the facts, the unbiased facts. Now for example last spring the freshmen from the dental college came down here, a real nice group of boys and they didn't know where to go, we took them down to the specialist on dental college the fiscal analyst office and had a meeting and they gave them the unbiased facts, and that is good but we must inform our constituents that the process is that they can get to the fiscal analyst to get to the facts. The fiscal analyst brings the facts to the budget committee so we can discuss them. I hope that I made myself clear.
