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and it was printed in there, so I'd just like to make that substitution before I speak on the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Waldron is asking unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment that appeared in the Journal on page 125. Are there any objections from the body to withdrawing that amendment. Hearing none. So ordered. Then the amendment is withdrawn. Back to you Senator Waldron.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, I move that the amendment be adopted. And I might be..it might be better to explain it rather than have the clerk read it. Because I'm not going to make much sense by reading it.

PRESIDENT: Go ahead.

SENATOR WALDRON: My amendment merely substitutes in place of the color of photograph as required on the drivers license. I'm substituting the right index fingerprint. Thereby we have a positive means of identification if that is needed, and not only that we eliminate the additional fee that is required by placing the photograph on the drivers license. Therefore, we will maintain the present fee of \$6 for your drivers license renewal. And we will also take care of those people that feel that they need positive identification more so than is given on the present Nebraska drivers license. And this will save Nebraskans quite a bit of money. I think Senator Anderson figured it up for us the last time, and it amounted to quite a substantial amount of money and it should satisfy those people that say we need a better type of drivers license for the State Patrol when they pick up a person, to make sure that it is actually that person. I think the present drivers license is sufficient for their means, but other people would disagree. Therefore, I ask adoption of this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion now of the Waldron substituted amendment. Senator Stromer.

SENATOR STROMER: Mr. President and colleagues. I think that there may be some merit here in the amendment as offered by Senator Waldron. But as he so frequently does, he will offer an amendment to completely change a bill which has not had a chance to be completely discussed or aired. And I would rather if he likes this particular proposal that there is still time for him to introduce the bill. And let's just vote on this issue, either as a photo on a drivers license or that it is something that we don't want. I think that we have had this particular bill on General File last year. And I think everybody is pretty well aware of the pros and cons, and I think we can go ahead and make a decision today just on that basis on this bill. If we want to get involved in anything else, I think there's still time for him to introduce another bill.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Goodrich Speaking on the Waldron amendment.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes, just a very short comment. I'd like to support Senator Stromer in this bill. It's his bill and I think we ought to leave it with just the way he drafted it. Because I would oppose the Waldron amendment. If Senator Waldron wants the fingerprint on it. Fine. But let's draft a separate bill for that. Because I'd like to see this bill pass in its present form. Thank you.
