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only be solved by who - by the Omaha School Board, that's where the problem is - the Omaha School Board. Anyone who lives in Omaha who has ever run for office in Omaha, particularly on a local office, knows if he knows anything, if he don't know it now, he will, that the Omaha School Board through the P.T.A. is one of the most powerful political operations in the State of Nebraska. Now all of these things are caused because those people want it like it is. They want it like it is. Think anyone in this body who has looked at the school situation in Omaha, particularly Senator Chambers District, but I want to say this. This problem is not peculiar to black people, it's just as peculiar to white people. It's just as peculiar to the Mexican American and it's more peculiar to the Indian people. There's people in my area, my district for example, who can't read or write either and there's not one there's a lot of them, and percentage wise related to the total there may not be as many but there close to it. Now this is much to do about nothing but I would agree with Senator Chambers it does indicate the following of the state if you pass this resolution. That the people of this state are opposed to forced bussing. That's all it says, now in the case of Senator Chambers the black people it doesn't prevent the Omaha School Board from offering to the black people or the white people bussing service if they want to use it - but they can't make them use it. Now this is a problem the Omaha School Board, we took a long step forward, a lot of us for example who like Senator Chambers and then on the other hand there is some I presume an equal number at least who have never been to Omaha to see the problem they have. I have. And we took his word for the problem that he has in the city of Omaha. But we have our problems too and the people of my district are all over whelming opposed to forced bussing. And I think when we pass legislation, we do it for the whole state. Now I'm willing to join with Senator Chambers and Senator Stahmer to do anything in the way of any legislation that will correct their problem in the city of Omaha from the standpoint of education abuses. Anything. And I always have. And I hope that you will vote Senator Stahmer's motion down because it won't accomplish anything because you leave it to the people out state, it's certainly not going to improve what you are now confronted with. Because the people out state don't want forced bussing.

PRESIDENT: The chair would like to explore something here in that Senator Stahmer actually your motion as worded is probably not in order, if we want to be critical here in that interim studies of course are referred to the Executive Board. This is on General File and it would seem to me that at this time if you want to take up something else that relates to this, you are going to have to bracket the bill or move to bracket it or do something but the chair is going to rule your motion out of order at this time.

SENATOR STAHMER: I challenge the chair, add the work bracket to the amendment. If you want to take a vote on it then, take a vote on it. But there has been far worse mickey mouse pulled on this floor with your approval.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stahmer, stand right now, I don't know that I understood what you said.

SENATOR STAHMER: I said add the words "bracket the bill" and then call for a study, if you want to be technically correct.

PRESIDENT: O.K. Stand by. Now the motion before the body is to bracket the bill indefinitely. Are there objections to bracketing LR 19 indefinitely? Any objections? All right. There are objections to that then fine, the motion - We'll have to
