PRESIDENT: The next to speak is Senator Anderson.
Senator Anderson are you passing.

SENATOR ANDERSON: Mr. President, and members of the body. I think Senator Snyder has pretty well covered the point I wanted to make that the parent of a handicapped child, orthopedically handicapped or retarded or something like this, quite often that child has to be brought to school. It can't walk to school some other child would, and I think this is something to be remembered when we think about taking this 4 mile limit off.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore. We're speaking about the committee amendments only.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, and fellow members. I think we probably should stop nip picking this bill and go ahead with it. It's good and it's something we've been working on for years. The way it sets now the 4 mile limit is tremendously equitable. And the folks that really have the problems in this particular area are those out in the open areas where I live. Some of these folks drive 100, 150 miles a day. And they really have a burden. And let's help them. Let's go ahead with the amendment the way it is and get on with our business.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lewis you still have a light on. Do you want to be recognized. O.K. very good. O.K. now any further discussion of the Kennedy substituted amendment. Senator Kennedy we are back to you then. Let's close on the amendment.

SENATOR KENNEDY: I would request that this amendment be adopted. Again I suppose we are talking about trial and error and costs and many things, but I think with our new program and 403 plus this transportation. I would like to see it tried, and then if we have faults, I'm sure these parents are not going to abuse it, and I have confidence that those that have transportation provided will still partake with it. I again say let us adopt this amendment as presented here this morning.

PRESIDENT: The question is then should the amendment be adopted. As proposed by Senator Kennedy. All those in favor please say aye, those opposed say no. The ayes have it. So ordered. The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, there is now a motion pending, by Senator Snyder.

PRESIDENT: All right, a motion by Senator Snyder

SENATOR SNYDER: May I.

PRESIDENT: What's your pleasure, Senator.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President, I have one further amendment here, that is clarifying language. The clerk has a copy of it.

PRESIDENT: An amendment to your amendment.

SENATOR SNYDER: A committee amendment.

PRESIDENT: An amendment to the committee amendment.

SENATOR SNYDER: I would speak on my amendment to the committee amendment. A clarifying amendment for language. You have the copy do you not? Do you have to read the amendment or anything?
