

with many public officials there do. Now this is an important bill and I have no criticism of Senator Goodrich neither do I have any criticism of the committee that heard it because probably, like many bills we take them at their face value. It may be that you may want to pass this bill. I'm only doing what one man can do to call your attention to what it could do, and what I think that it will do. Now if this is what you want, lets vote the bill and make it the law.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President, I must say I much enjoyed the remarks made by Senator Carpenter. They were much in line with the thought that I had on this bill. I think that the people who...I would like to see this bill passed certainly do so with good intentions and I don't believe that there is any design on their part for but I think that we do have to be cautious in this area and I would whole heartedly agree that although the intentions would be good and I have no reason to believe that they would not be honorable for whatever design that they have at the present time, we must be mindful that when this or any other law is put into statute it is there to stay and often times some irreputable harm could be done before you have a chance to reverse it. I think that in this case where there is no check and balance we are saying that Senator Carpenter says a willing buyer and a willing seller get together with tax payers money, no public hearing necessary, no notification to the public, I think that there is a very big danger there that is just too large for this body or anybody of a legislative nature to say yes, we will intrust the future of the people and their tax dollars to an arrangement such as this. I apologize to Senator Goodrich for I have not read the bill prior to it being brought up on the floor. I did not have a chance to question with him the thoughts that I have on the dangers that I see here so I think that we have no choice if we are to be legislators and in the interest of the people we have no choice but in this case to kill this bill and the sooner the better.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, members of the legislature in due respect to the committee system in this legislature I'm going to have to vote against this motion to indefinitely postpone. Every person in this committee voted to put this bill on the floor so I think that it must have some merit. Now if the University has gifts made to it like farm land for example some people give farms to the University. It is income producing property, then I don't see any particular reason for going through all of this rig-a-maroll that is required, so it would seem to me that we should be courteous enough to Senators Goodrich and....a...to hold this bill over and until we can better understand this bill and get some input from the University of Nebraska on this. I have to vote to oppose indefinitely postponing simply because I feel that there must be some merit here or this committee would not put it on the floor.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. President, I'm sure that all of us would agree that the power of eminent domain is actually a knife in
