determinations of what programs are necessary for the people in the state for the welfare and the uplift of the people in the state then if it takes a certain amount of money to fund these programs we have to look at the sources of revenue available to the state and tap those sources and properly fund these programs. I'm in favor of raising the income tax. I'm in favor of a raise in corporation taxes. I'm in favor of a tax on intangibles and an increased tax on insurance premiums. So we have means of raising revenue. I think we should not limit it only to the sales and income tax, because I'd like to see the sales tax abolished all together. I just have one other thing to say. Remember power corrupts. Absolute power corrupts absolutely. The Governor has power. It's up to the Legislature to determine whether he will have absolute power and be absolutely corrupted thereby.
