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And I'm very hopeful that I believe when the cost is known if it anywhere in the bounds of acceptability we start with one side or the other to glass it in. And maybe Senator Goodrich can indicate to this body when he expects to have an estimate.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: Certainly I am interested in that, and I rise now to speak on a point of personal privilege on something that concerns me, that concerns me very deeply.

PRESIDENT: State your point Senator.

SENATOR LEWIS: On a number of visits to the United States Congress, probably 30 or 40. The thing that bothered me more than anything else is the total isolation of the United States Congress. Those of you who have been there, know that you go into a particular gallery. They have about 6 for different groups. You may not write anything down. You will have all deference and all respect. It's almost like going before the king and his courts. And certainly I am for order. I am for what we need to do on this floor for order to go with our business. But if we get to the point where we're not accessible and where we reverse the situation. Because the people are paying the load and they expect to have accessibility to the Legislative body. Now that's probably what makes us more responsible is the fact that we represent thirty thousand people. And we only have a million and a half people here. So certainly, I'm trying to say, that let's not go so far with this thing that we are isolated, over protected, that people cannot have accessibility to us.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes, excuse me. Senator Whitney. And then Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I presume that it is the prerogative of the Executive Board, to do this or not to do it. But I'd like to recommend that if they decide to do it, let's not do it all at the same time. Let's just do that behind the two pillars there. Behind the ropes first. Before we do that to front end here of the Legislature. We have to leave often to answer telephone calls outside of this particular room, and sometimes workers in the Legislature wish to come and sit just for a moment, ten seconds, at these desks. And I feel that if we have to open a glass door to get through that this is going to inconvenience us, and so I hope that if the Executive Board does this they start in on the back end of the room and try it out first, and then see what happens.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: A matter of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: State your point Senator.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Now I'm in sympathy with young people. Believe it or not I used to be young myself. And I understand their ideals. And I hope they understand us. And for their benefit which they probably don't know. This is the only legislation in the 50 states that in all of their activities on the floor, which is broadcast in a capsulization of 30 minutes of everything we say here. No other state would even think of that, let alone do it. Many members here were opposed
