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they start blasting in there they have permission from the farmer before they do this.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President will Senator DeCamp yield to a question please?

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp yield?

SENATOR WHITNEY: Now I as a land owner am not clear to give permission. Because I'm down here in the Legislature. But I want everybody to shoot coyotes on my farm. Now is there some way that you could amend this bill? Such that the land owner could do this and let the people who want to shoot coyotes have that right to shoot on that landowners farm?

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, Senator Whitney I don't think you need to write anything special into the law. The same way with pheasant hunting, Mr. Jones has permission from year to year to go on your land and he knows and you know it and you don't have to be there all the time. If it is a group of strange coyote hunters that maybe have never been in the area that came there maybe you wouldn't want them. So if you are going to start writing in the laws that except when I put up a sign that says such and such then anybody can go on..you are just going in circles. The amendment is very simple, the purpose is very simple, and the problem you raise I don't think is a problem because as I say it can be solved by you giving general permission by word of mouth or whatever. Remember if you are upset. If you are not upset about somebody shooting in there why then there is no problem in the first place.

SENATOR WHITNEY: There is no problem, because there is no penalty, is that it?

SENATOR DECAMP: Well complainant, you. There is a penalty. The amendment doesn't have a penalty. The penalty is further on in the bill. In the grouping bill.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: Well Senators I just want to call to your attention a couple little things about this bill. That has been come to my attention in no uncertain terms the last few days. And that is that I am receiving letters from farmers is this bill. That they don't like the idea of shooting rifles into their farms. Now the other day we had a bill up and there was a lot of malarkey raised about the bill that somebody was taking property rights away from someone. And in this bill if that was true on the otherone, which it was not, it certainly true on this one. I want you to think about this. You people from rural Nebraska. The law is that you can't hunt on private property without permission. Whether it is posted or not. This morning you have had a display here of someone saying, well as long ..if there is no sign there it's O.K. That's the way I get it. Now bear in mind, and I'm not bleeding over this bill in any way. I just want to call a few attention to you of some holes in this bill. You have a coyote running and you know as well as I do that noone's going to stop and get permission to shoot the coyote. It's as simple as that. No one is going to do it you don't have time. So actually what you are doing here is by legislation you are allowing trespassing. When it comes right down to it. NOW I Know you have a coyote problem. The other day in our committee we had some more farmers,
