

SENATOR CARPENTER: OK

SENATOR GOODRICH: The city of Lincoln, city of Kearney and the Railroad Association are the other three that wanted the change.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well Mr. President....

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Let me say to Senator Goodrich unless you amend the bill, I am going to attempt to kill it.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I have no objection to restricting it, frankly to the city of Omaha. That was the original intent.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, I move to amend the bill that it applies only to the city of Omaha.

PRESIDENT: We have the committee amendments pending Senator Carpenter, and then we will take up your amendment to the bill then.

SENATOR CARPENTER: OK.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Is there further discussion of the committee amendments? Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, I would like to ask Senator Goodrich a question.

PRESIDENT: OK, Senator Goodrich yeild?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes.

SENATOR KEYES: If this should become law, would this then assume that the state of Nebraska is going to be obligated to notify the citizenary of all statutes so that they will know what is going to happen? This could put us in a terrible obligation.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Wait a minute. Drive that by once more.

SENATOR KEYES: This simply states that if this becomes law then setting a policy whereby the state of Nebraska or the cities or any ennity of government would have to notify its citizens of what is happening and this would simply state that we would notify the citizens of the laws of this state.

SENATOR GOODRICH: This only pertains to notices on special assessments, Senator Keyes, and that is the way the law is right now, that all political subdivisions must notify by certified mail.

SENATOR KEYES: I have a good friend of mine who said that he didn't know that the wage increase had went up to, that the minimum wage had went up. Therefore a year later he was penalized, he thought that the state ought to notify them. If we are going to notify them on one thing perhaps we ought notify them on all.

SENATOR GOODRICH: That would be a different bill entirely and I can concur with you, but that doesn't effect the bill.
