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direction we wanted to go. And I say that for these reasons. I think it is rather obvious that making a switch this winter becomes an impossibility, but I also think it's rather obvious at least to a lot of people, that by this time next year this Legislature and this State are not going to tolerate another winter of Daylight Savings Time. Remember this year we are only getting half of the full dose, or maybe even less. We started Daylight Savings Time when the days were actually getting longer. Next year we will be going in, we'll have it when they get shorter all the time. Now we've seen a lot of switching and change of attitudes in a very short time on this issue. I think less than a week ago the World Herald, for example, had an editorial in which they suggested maybe that those of us who thought that we should have Daylight savings Time had lost our wits, or that we should have it abandoned. We had lost our wits. I think they specifically mention me, which is not unusual. This week, this morning I noted the World Herald had an editorial in which they had eventually what I interpreted it to be a hundred percent change. Now they say maybe it is wrong, and that any energy savings that does result from it is certainly not worth the deaths and the other problems that have been caused. So with that leadership I would think that's the sign of this Legislature that we should at least be getting this bill out where it can be used as a pressure tactic upon that I mean exactly that, a pressure tactic upon the Federal Government to re-examine and re-examine now, possibly it was the leadership of Senator Curtis and Senator Hruska, and Senator Mansfield who are re-examining their position on this that gave the incentive to some of the newspapers and other media to switch on daylight savings time. Whatever the case, the trend is going to be to get rid of this thing by next year. Now more than 30 Senators have signed a resolution in which we already sent to the President and to the Congress, and that resolution said, Look Congress re-examine your position because we don't think this is what we want. And so let's get the bill up, as I say I give you my promise. Those of you who are urban Senators that know action will certainly be taken by I think it is a most important pressure tactic that we have to use right now to get some immediate re-study of this whole situation. So I would ask your permission to revive this bill and put it on the floor of the Legislature where it can be used either in it's original form or an amended form to get us out of the havoc created by Daylight Savings Time.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. As Chairman of the Urban Affairs Committee I feel that I should make a couple of comments regarding LB 651. The bill was killed with only one descending vote in committee. Senator DeCamp in presenting his bill said it was close symbolic protest in presenting his bill to the Federal Government. I suppose that I as much as anyone in here enjoyed the symbolic protest to the Federal Government. But in this case we are protesting something that would put us out of complete sync, with the rest of the country. I don't enjoy Uncle Sam telling us what to do. At the same time there is common sense that has to come into our decision making, and I can't see Nebraska being the only one that is out of sync. I think that as I told Senator DeCamp at the hearing, the issue was discussed once on the floor of the Legislature. Was given a fair, just, and I believe a rather lengthy hearing. I don't believe it was ram roded through one way or the other. And while there is consternation in the minds of many, we don't like to see these issues coming back, and back, and back. As I
