

SENATOR CARPENTER: Yes it is.

PRESIDENT: Alright, we have a motion to adjourn, wait a minute, Senator Mahoney, any further discussion? Any other business to come before the body?

CLERK: Show the Carpenter amendment pending then?

PRESIDENT: Show the Carpenter amendment pending.

CLERK: Read reference report, notice of committee hearings. Motion to introduce 2 bills by Senator Luedtke.

PRESIDENT: Alright, Senator LUedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, you have the two request numbers on your desk, 1529 and 1551, they are judiciary committee bills on penal correctional reform. SENator Richendifer, don't leave until you vote on this. These are our bills, one of them 1529 is the uniform out-of-state parolee supervision compact requested by the corrections department and the 1551 is a bill which comes as a result of our citizens conference, which removes the necessity of a recommendation from the board of parole before a prisoner can be placed on work release. THis matter of work release and furloughs and also as for specific travel orders out side of the state. We have some problems with out of state travel which we need some legislation on.

PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion? The motion is to suspend the rules and introduce the two bills that were outlined by Senator Luedtke. All those in favor of suspending the rules, for the introduction of the two bills vote aye, those opposed vote no. SPEAKER PROUD: Senator Luedtke, can you do this in the morning?

PRESIDENT: He won't be here tomorrow, that is the problem.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I would like to set them for a hearing so that we can get them introduced.

SENATOR PROUD: OK.

PRESIDENT: We have enough people here if they would just come and vote, they are just standing around. Do you want a call of the house Senator Luedtke?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I'm going to ask for it.

PRESIDENT: Alright, Clerk will clear the board. The Chair understands that but as the Chair sits up here and lobbys for votes, and then I get criticised. I'm not going to do that. Senator Luedtke has asked for a call of the house. All those in favor of a call of the house will vote aye.
