CLERK: 20 ayes, and 19 nays to raise the call.

PRESIDENT: Call is raised. Read the tally of the original vote. Senator Carpenter.

CLERK: No it isn't.

PRESIDENT: Stand by just a minute. The rule is found on page 39. Call of house and notice the names of absentees and proceedings on the call may be suspended at any time by the majority of the members then present. Pardon me sir, I didn't hear the question.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Is the matter of the introduction of the two bills still pending when we again meet?

PRESIDENT: No, the results are announced and the motion fails and the motion then can begin, I presume there is no reason why the Chair would understand why the motion couldn't again be made at another time. We are not under a call of the house because it says a simple majority can take away that and it was a 20 to 19 vote.

CLERK: 20 ayes, and 8 nays Mr. President on the original motion to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT: 20 ayes and 8 nays?

CLERK: 28 ayes and 8 nays.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The motion is lost to suspend the rules for the introduction of rules, the Chair now recognizes Speaker Proud.

SPEAKER PROUD: Where are we now? What is the situation now on this?

PRESIDENT: The motion is lost to suspend the rules.

SPEAKER PROUD: Do you have a motion to adjourn? Is that in order?

CLERK: Yes sir. I move that we adjourn until 9:00 on February 1st.

PRESIDENT: Motion is to adjourn until 9:00 tomorrow. All those in favor say aye, those opposed say no. Ayes have it so ordered we are adjourned until 9:00 tomorrow.
