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record is made here it is a public record and must be maintained as such.

PRESIDENT: There is a rule however, where someone can take exception to remarks which have been made on the floor and that's ..I.. the Chair would construe that particular rule at least to be in affect in this particular instance. Now, Senator Stahmer for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR STAHMER: I want to support Senator Stull in his motion because as I will also bet Senator Mahoney a steak dinner that when this bill is passed in it's form it will not accomplish what Senator Carpenter set out to accomplish.

PRESIDENT: Stand by just a minute, please. We're back to the situation involving the rules. Senator Waldron has with his understanding of the rules, probably has spoken correctly. Section 9, page 10 under rule 2 says thus, "If a member is called to order for a word spoken in debate, the member calling him to order shall indicate the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's desk. I presume that they have been. And then they shall be read aloud to the Legislature. But he shall not be held to answer, nor be subject to the censor of the Legislature, therefore the further debate of other business shall have intervened." Senator Stull's motion is timely, and the Chair presumes that the words were taken down that had been excepted to. I think probably now the next move is what should we do? Senator Simpson do you have any imput.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, I would assume that is all that the rules say, so if there is anyone wanting any further action, they would have to suspend the rules, because I see no way that this can be dropped from the record, only that it now would be noted in the record, but that this exception was taken, and so that the matter should lie there and be forgotten.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Stull do you have imput.

SENATOR STULL: I would ask that my motion be withdrawn. I ask unanimous consent. I think it is bad for one member to say something that of another member can take exception to. And I voted the other way, and I feel that my vote was justified and I don't like to have those remarks made. But I think I made my point, and let's get on with the business.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to the withdrawal of Senator Stull's motion. Hearing none. So ordered. Then that is withdrawn. And the motion under debate is the unanimous..Excuse me is the motion made by Senator Snyder which would add Senator Mahoney's name to the bill. That's what we're debating at this time. Now then, are you ready for the question? Senator Carpenter?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Are we voting on that Senator Mahoney has no objection to hav ing his name on the bill. Because if he does a lot of us can get in trouble by having a name put on bills when we are here or not here. Let me make one further motion. If you advance this bill to Select File on the aid to transportation. Hold it there. In the meantime I will get another bill introduced. And hold it there until this bill catches up with it, if it does. I think this has been a healthy waste of time. We've discussed things. This is a political
