SENATOR MOYLAN: Well that is possible alright, but they have until 1976 to get them, and they may have to have new tires by that time anyway. If they ride their bike very much.

PRESIDENT: Senator Moylan, Senator Barnett's last request to you was would you mind bracketing the bill?

SENATOR MOYLAN: No, that is OK with me but I did want to explain the type of reflective material that is available.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. Chairman, I don't want to hold up his bill if the body doesn't feel that it is important that we discuss this as far as the penalty section is concerned. A lot of them are not paying attention and some of them are paying attention. We talked today of penal reform, we talked today of the juvenile and here we have a bill that has been amended to make the juvenile pay a monetary fine, regardless of age. I would have to oppose it on those grounds and hope that we could come up with some way of letting the child get the attention of what he should do as a law abiding citizen, through essays or whatever. I would like to have some input on it before I have to have it bracketed. Maybe the body doesn't feel that way.

PRESIDENT: Alright, stand by. Senator Kremer, do you have input?

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, yes, unless they want to bracket the bill. If you are going to bracket it I have no input. But if I may say this. The committee debated for some time putting this penalty section on and I feel a little bit like Senator Barnett, and I would offer an amendment to the extent that you strike the and it is part of the bill now that it has been amended, that in the amendment strike after fine then strike in lieu thereof of a penalty not to exceed fifteen dollars, would that Senator Barnett do what you are talking about?

PRESIDENT: The amendment would be to add a limitation.

SENATOR BARNETT: I think that it would help, there is no indication of essays or anything in there. That might be a good idea at that time to remove the minimum now and then we can look at it while it is taking its time across the board if we think that it needs to have essay or other type of penalty put into this then we can do it. I hope that you understand what I am saying. The rich parents can pay the fine, the poor parents are going to have to have the kids go out and find a job or something, I don't know how they are going to pay it.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman the reason I offer this amendment is that this is going to be a new program for bicycle riders and when it is time for all of them to become aware of it. I do offer that amendment and let the bill go on that way and I'll send the amendment up to the Clerk's desk.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, I think that we have it. Senator Moylan.
