

If you have got something to say you be at that committee hearing, and I quite agree with you Senator Duis, then they ought to say if they are there for the Governor, for themselves or the department or for whom, and that would clarify it.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: I would like to, I suppose address a question to Andy Devines friend, Senator Duis. I won't ask him to speak on the issue, he is saving his voice for a duet with Andy later. Senator Duis, would it be possible to add to your consideration of introduction of committee bills to place a limitation of 10 bills on committee introductions? It seems to me that we all stand on our head and try to bring some order of slow and deliberate consideration of bills here by placing a limitation upon ourselves and then we have committees come in with 30 bills, 40 bills and I think that either a committee should enjoy the same restrictions that the individual senator does, or a senator should enjoy the same lack of restriction that the committee does. We are defeating ourselves in that no one on the committee serving with his fellow committee members feels too much of an inclination to deny to sign for a committee bill. I think that truly we are hanging ourselves out to dry here with this flood of bills that has brought about the very situation that we are talking about now.

SENATOR DUIS: Senator Murphy, I suggest and I do this respectfully suggest that you introduce this as a separate rule change so that we don't get this one cluttered up. I will tell you this. I now have on my desk, three bills that the committee wants to introduce, which I am not going to sign. I have that perfect right not to sign those particular bills and they do need a majority of the committee to sign them. I think that you will find Senator Murphy that if we make a rule change so that they have to clear the Governor, I think that you will find that most all of these bills coming into committee now are coming in from agency departments, not from individuals. If that Governor of the state of Nebraska and I know how decisive he is, I think that if they have to clear through him, that we won't have near that many because the Governor is a very conservative man.

SENATOR MURPHY: You would prepare a separate resolution requesting a limitation on committee bills?

SENATOR DUIS: Yes, I would Senator Murphy, because I think that we need to have separate issues, so that we don't get too many issues in one motion.

SENATOR MURPHY: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, fellow members in reply to Senator Murphy, the Governor can introduce as many bills as he wants. So if he passes, so if the coagency takes their bills to the Governor there is no limit so we don't have to have a 10 bill limit. So this would be repetitious to put a limitation on code agency bills because they serve under the pleasure of the Governor.

PRESIDENT: Thank you Senator Nore. Actually we have under discussion and I wonder if you are all through discussing it. It is to dispatch the issue here of this proposed rule change that Senator Carpenter has come up with. We have the amendment
