CLERK: Mr. President, the motion that Senator Carpenter signed said the south wall. The reason I put the word south in there because Senator Goodrich had showed me the blue prints which covered the south wall.

PRESIDENT: Then the amendment isn't necessary. The Chair would so rule. Now. Next to speak is Senator Dickinson, and then Senator Hasebroock.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I'm sorry I was out of the room when the motion was started. What is the motion?

PRESIDENT: The motion is to accept the lowest bid and glass in the south side. The construction to begin immediately.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I still don't know when everybody starts telling me at one time. Please repeat it again.

PRESIDENT: The motion is,

CLERK: The motion is to accept the low bid given to Senator Goodrich for the glass installation of the south wall of the chamber which amounts to \$3,450.00.

SENATOR DICKINSON: This comes as rather a surprise. I think Senator Carpenter is using an arrogant approach in getting a bid on this without the consent of the Legislature at all. And surely there's a lot of opposition to this. And I simply want to speak out to opposing these philosophy for more than one reason. The confusion on this floor is created by us on the floor and not by those people under the wings in my opinion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dickinson, the Legislature did authorize Senator Carpenter to get bids. I was in the Chair at the particular time when that went through. So I would have to only correct you on that point. Go ahead.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I oppose the glassing in of the south side or the north side. I think it's.. and you Mr. President have referred many times to the decor of this room and in describing it to visitors here, and I think you are absolutely right. This spoil it much as these telephone booths in the back of the room have spoiled it from a matter of that stand point and I certainly would oppose putting glass or aluminum over here at the side of the wall and I don't think it would accomplish what it's set out to accomplish.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes former Speaker Hasebroock.

SENATOR HASEBROOCK: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. Just one point I want to clear up and I think that's the amount of money. I think Senator Carpenter might have mispoken himself it's \$3450 . Somebody said \$33,000. And so it's three thousand and four hundred and fifty. That makes a lot of difference.

PRESIDENT: Thank you Senator Hasebroock. Now..Well I don't really know where to begin I have one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, lights on and we have a motion up here to adjourn and I have some introductions that I would like to make. Let's try Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER: I would advise you that the adjournment motion takes precedence.
