SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President and members of the Legislature I move the adoption of the amendment. The amendment reads on page 2, line 2, strike 53 and insert 65. And insert 987 after thousand. Now the total amount of money here is one hundred and fifty, it was a hundred and fifty three thousand, but by putting it through the computer and the fiscal analyst

and the agriculture department has determined that the necessary amount is 165,987. And the other changes are it changes 73 to 74 on page 2 line 4 strike 74 and insert 75. Updating it because this was a bill carried over from last year. I move to the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to adopt. Is there any further discussion. If not, all those in favor vote aye, those opposed voted nay. It takes 25 votes voting aye. It takes 25 votes to adopt the motion. Is there one of you that hasn't voted. We still need 25 votes. There we've got it. Thank you. The Clerk will record.

CLERK: Senator Simpson voting aye. 25 ayes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Now Senator Burbach do the bill.

SENATOR BURBACH: I move to advance LB 17A to E & R for Engrossing.

PRESIDENT: Move and seconded to advance the bill. All in favor say aye. Opposed say nay. The bill is advanced. Do we have any reconsideration motion.

CLERK: No, but I have a series of motions to introduce bills. Mr. President for the introduction of the attached bill (Signed) Senator Schmit. (read) The bill is signed by the members of the Agriculture Committee.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature I move the adoption for introduction of the bill. The reason for this bill is the outgrowth of one of the interim study committees and I think you will remember we had several hearings on the beef price spread, and we had several hearings also on my capacity as Chairman of the sub-committee on energy. And in several instances we discovered there is a distinct on the part of many citizens that there is collusion in the price fixing area. And this bill provides that there be a member delegated to the Attorney General's office whose specific duty shall relate to investigation of anti-trust violations, and we checked it with the Attorney General's office. They wanted us not to limit his activities to that area so that he could be utilized in other areas. But he would be specifically qualified for anti-trust investigations. And I think it is a worthwhile bill and I hope that the members of this Legislature will vote to introduce it.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion. If not the motion is to introduce the bill. It takes 30 votes. All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Voting aye.
