

SENATOR DICKINSON: Would I be out of order Mr. President to ask for more information. It seems like we are introducing these bills all the time and we really don't know what they are all about, maybe we don't need to know what they are, but I think that we should.

PRESIDENT: Senator you are in order.

SENATOR DICKINSON: In what area are we talking about?

SENATOR CARPENTER: The area of agriculture products and things of a like nature.

SENATOR DICKINSON: You are proposing to exempt them from the present exemption then that they now enjoy, is that it?

SENATOR CARPENTER: No, I am proposing to have a hearing and let the truckers come and some say that they want a bill and some say that they don't in order to determine what they want and whether this body feels that they ought to help them.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Thank you.

SENATOR CARPENTER: This does nothing in so far as making the law, it still takes 25 votes to do anything, so I would think as a matter of courtesy in some reasonable limitation that this body ought to do for one that is done for others.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I guess I want to respond to Senator Carpenter's comment that it does nothing to make it into law. This is the first step for making anything into law is to introduce a bill and have a public hearing.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Just to respond, it makes just as much sense to me to have a committee kill a bill or hold a bill by a tremendous importance to the people of this state, and not give this body a chance to express its wisdom and judgment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, fellow members I certainly support Senator Carpenter. It isn't the truckers that are just involved in this. It is the farmers. We are going to have a terrible situation here in a month or so on fertilizers and there...they are really more interested than some of the truckers are. They are real happy that we in this body have taken the action we have concerning the truckers. I don't think that you should take too much at heart, what the World Herald Public Pulse letters that were I think organized along with the editorial and I just let it go in one ear and out the other because the farmers are behind it, in trying to get some kind of a solution so that they can get the fertilizer needed to grow the crops.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the motion to introduce the bill? Alright, the question is then shall the bill be introduced? All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. Once again the motion does take 30 votes. Thank you. clerk will record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays.
