

on General File, it is not on Final Reading so we know what the Legislature is going to do. There is no limitation that you can come up with but what the fault will be found with it, and if the only practical thing to me would be to deal with this as a separate bill and the vehicle is here to do it and I would hope that you would reject the adoption of any limitation or any kind of amendment dealing with limitations at this point and 772.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lewis, Frank Lewis?

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: Very briefly Mr. President, and I would re-echo what Senator Warner said that certainly if we are talking about a state aid bill, let's talk about state aid to education. If we want to get into the general area of discussion of limitations, that is a horse of a different color and I would support Senator Warner in not only asking for the rejection of this amendment but any subsequent amendments involving limitations in the state aid bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Duis?

SENATOR DUIS: Well Mr. President, I will concur with Senator Warner in his, but there is one part of this amendment Senator Warner that we need that we have adopted the other and that is the part, withdraw all of the part of it except the third section which says on page 23 after line 16

insert, and that states the amount of money that we need in the bill for the implementation of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Stand by, what amendment are you discussing Senator Duis?

SENATOR DUIS: My amendment.

PRESIDENT: We only have before the body at this time, Senator Maresh's amendment to the second Carpenter amendment.

SENATOR DUIS: Alright fine, then we will go ahead and vote on Senator Maresh's amendment, I would then oppose his amendment so that we can get back to mine so I can strike all of it except the one part and we can take up the limitation of spending and the separate bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Proud, did you wish to be heard on the issue? It is the Maresh amendment only.

SENATOR PROUD: I just wanted to say that certainly I have nothing against Senator Maresh and his amendment but Senator Warner has spent hours and weeks and what has now become years studying this question and I would just be inclined to take his word at this point, that is all, and therefore I would oppose the Maresh amendment.

PRESIDENT: Now Senator Maresh, what is your pleasure?

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, if the original Carpenter amendment will be withdrawn, I would withdraw my amendment too because I am amending an amendment that is going to withdrawn and there is no sense in adopting an amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment before the body is the Carpenter amendment, and now Maresh's amendment to, there is where we are, Senator Duis?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I would like to strike that part of the amendment, then with the exception of on page 23 after line 16
