

SENATOR NORE: No... By printing it. But why not, if it's good to hear to not print his name on the ballot why not print...why is it good to not print the school board members?

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: Well I didn't have that opportunity in my District. There were five that ran against me.

SENATOR NORE: Well, you know that there are many occasions when there is only one person on the Unicameral Ticket. So according to Senator Murphy's policy, that's his policy, let's not put his name on the ballot in the primary.

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: Well, Senator Murphy...Senator Nore, the way we have it now, we don't even have a primary in the school elections. We don't even have a primary. We have 11 people running for one job. That's what we're trying to correct.

SENATOR NORE: We want a primary.

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: That's exactly my position.

SENATOR NORE: The public wants a primary. The administrators do not want a primary.

PRESIDENT: Senator Murphy?

SENATOR MURPHY: Nore?

PRESIDENT: Alright, Senator Nore will you yield to a question?

SENATOR NORE: Yes.

SENATOR MURPHY: Senator Nore, in the Journal on page 599. Does it not set forth very clearly that both petition and write-in candidates will be eligible under a Class 3 School District Election under this amendment?

SENATOR NORE: It would be impossible to have a write-in petition if there were no other names on the...if there were no primary. You've got to have a primary first.

SENATOR MURPHY: Not according the Attorney General on page 599, Senator.

SENATOR NORE: The Attorney General says that you must have a... in order to have a write-in you must have a primary, to have a write-in in the primary. If you don't have any, how are you going to have a write-in?

SENATOR MURPHY: I would refer you to the Attorney General's letter on page 599.

SENATOR NORE: Well, he says it's a matter of policy. This is a matter of policy. Do you want a primary or don't you want a primary? That's the essence of the...

SENATOR MURPHY: Ok, not want a needless primary.

SENATOR NORE: OK, I would say then if a man have no opposition in the Unicameral it's a needless primary. Is that right?

SENATOR MURPHY: Senator Nore, if you have one person running for the Unicameral, why go to all the expense of putting his name on the primary ballot?
