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we're talking about very sincere dedicated people, and I can tell you when I first came to this Legislature that we grilled in some detail these people as to why they receive any money or not. So this is not an area that has been overlooked, and I think we would make a serious mistake if we overlooked the cooperative effort between State Government and private organizations such as these.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. Chairman and fellow members for the benefit of Senator Lewis and others. I think probably one good example is the Nebraska Crop and Improvement Association. If your scientists learn how to plant a plant that will grow two blades instead of one, they turn this information over to the Nebraska Crop and Improvement Association with just a very little money and that is why we have this tremendous yield of wheat and corn because of this Improvement Association. We get it out on a wholesale basis to the grower. So this money is probably the best money that we spend.

PRESIDENT: Senator Fowler, back to you. Senator Fowler had another question, I believe. It was back on ETV, Senator Fowler?

SENATOR FOWLER: Yes, is the other discussion over? I didn't..

PRESIDENT: Well, I thought it was, but apparently it is not. Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: In the same area. I have some questions and after studying it, some things that I don't understand, and some things that the staff people told me. In that same agency Senator Marvel, there is something called, Comprehensive emergency, and that appropriation has gone up 500% last year.

SENATOR MARVEL: Which area are you talking about now?

PRESIDENT: Comprehensive emergencies.

SENATOR LEWIS: Well, I'm trying to follow both the budget information, which is much more thorough than the bill itself. But the program 587 is called "comprehensive emergencies" spent \$75,000 for that last year. What's that?

SENATOR MARVEL: Yes, Senator Lewis are you talking about Program 587 and comprehensive emergencies? The \$50,000? Is that the area? O.K. This a..well historical expenditures I have here go back to 1967, which include almost \$22,000 in 67 for hog cholera outbreak, 68 the same outbreak \$22,000. 69 hog cholera outbreak \$16,000. 1970 \$59,000 for hog cholera outbreak and \$1,000 for grasshopper infestation. 71 a little over \$2,00 for scabies. 72 \$22,000 for scabies and hog cholera outbreak. 73 \$10,000 for scabies and this is an estimate by the department that following the historical data that I've indicated will or should at least meet the emergency conditions. Now is this what you had in mind?

PRESIDENT: Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: How does that work? Who does the money go to?
