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gotten along on that and I think in our consumer courses in our high schools, they're taught that the buyer should always beware. If you go to an auction, beware, you have a real good salesman who's selling you something and if you pay too much, why, that's your hard luck. Usually when I get in a bad deal, I learn a pretty good lesson and it's very educational to me. I've had some deals that have cost me quite a bit of money but it's been well worth it.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion? Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: You have an amendment on the Clerk's desk, which in substance replaces Senator Waldron's. It does one or two major things.

PRESIDENT: Excuse me, Senator Murphy. Are you offering that as an amendment to Senator Waldron's amendment at this time?

SENATOR MURPHY: It is in fact a substitute bill in the form of an amendment just as his amendment was a substitute for the original bill.

PRESIDENT: Well, then, you are moving to substitute your amendment for his. I just want to get this procedurally correct.

SENATOR MURPHY: I wanted to let whatever prior discussion that would be relative to his bill clear before I made the amendment. You were asking if there were others and I....

PRESIDENT: You want to make an amendment then to Senator Waldron's amendment by striking Senator Waldron's amendment and substituting yours. Is that correct?

SENATOR MURPHY: That's correct.

PRESIDENT: Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: The discussions made relative to this bill so far are in most instances very well meant. However, I think there are a couple of things that are lacking, a couple of things that are unnecessary in Senator Waldron's amendment. I specifically refer to Section 5 dealing with what are defined as unconscionable acts. Somewhere in that list, if you hiccup, you're going to be guilty. Now, there is an unfortunate circumstance in that the uniform code, and I'm starting to talk like a lawyer now, but in the uniform code, they use the word "unconscionable" which has been without definition. The amendment that I have given you that deals with the word "unconscionable", I think, brings it much more clearly into focus and does not subject everyone in the world to prosecution under this act. Now, it was brought out that the act itself did not constitute that a violation of the act as written did not constitute a misdemeanor so I would assume the act is without enforcement unless the court issues an order which you then violate. Unfortunately, in Senator Waldron's bill, if a party should innocently, unmeaningfully violate this court order, he is then subject to a felony and a \$10,000 fine. The substitute amendment that I have would require that he willfully violate this act, this court order I should say. Now, if you.....

PRESIDENT: Excuse me, Senator Murphy. Request has been made of the Chair that, for the Clerk to read your amendment. You have no objection to that, do you?

SENATOR MURPHY: It is, the total bill, I have no objection, no sir. He'll be reading for awhile.

PRESIDENT: You have placed that on the desks of the members, have you not?

SENATOR MURPHY: I have placed it in the Journal and it's in the Journal yesterday, 599.
