Additionally, we're delighted to have young people here all the time who show an interest in our legislative process. Now then, we do have some bills for introduction and I have some lights on. Let's see what we can do here. Senator Duis, for what purpose did you want to be recognized?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I have an announcement to make that someone or all should hear if at all possible to get their attention. Gentlemen of the Legislature, this afternoon at 1:30 the Rules Committee of this Legislature will meet to consider five rule changes. Three of them held over from last session, one by Senator DeCamp. One by the Rules Committee. One by Senator Johnson. One by Senator Carpenter. Those three were held over. The fourth one by Senator Carpenter and the fifth one by Senator Murphy. Will all those who are interested please take note because that hearing will be at 1:30 this afternoon. Room 2230. That's the east lounge.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Syas now. For what purpose did you want to be recognized?

SENATOR SYAS: I want to ask unanimous consent to put these two Attorney General's opinions in the Journal. They are old opinions but the explanation is, in constitutional revision, we had a bill introduced that did the same thing and the Attorney General on these opinions. We have indefinitely postponed the bill because this will show the Legislature the bills were not needed. I think they should review them, have the opportunity, and people on the outside could know what we are now doing in a certain category is legal by the Attorney Generals ruling and I think it would be helpful to put both of these in the Journal so that everyone would be, didn't know it before will know it now. That's all I'm asking, for unanimous consent to put both these in the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to printing the two opinions? Any objections?

SENATOR SYAS: There's old opinions but should be renewed and reread.

PRESIDENT: Any objections? Hearing none, so ordered, they will be printed then. Now, Senator Kremer, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, I hate to open this thing up again but I did have my light on when Senator Stull discussed his motion to move a bill ahead. I was out of the room. I'll lay this before you and you can do as you like about it. We need to consider the speed limit bill because the Federal Act says that we do have to comply by the 2nd or 3rd of March as far as sitting the speed limit to comply with the Federal Act. So, I'm going to make the motion that LB779 which has to do with setting the speed limit that it be placed at the head of General File for Wednesday.
