

somebody walking by with a reflectorized shirt on. Or something of the kind. I still think that the responsibility should be on the person who is riding the bicycle. That is the one that we are trying to control to prevent them from traffic infractions. Of course Senator Luedtke is shaking his head, and he is an attorney. But, I still believe and I have raised a few children, I think that they should have the responsibility. I think that they need responsibility and I think that it is alright, of course it doesn't pertain to the children but that is the big argument here. It pertains to anyone riding a bicycle. The judge has the option of fining them a penalty up to \$15 there is no minimum on it and they can remind them and they can tell them not to do it again and they can put them to work they can do anything that the judge says or sees fit to do, and if you become a habitual violator he can put a fine on them. I would so move that LB827 be returned to Select File for this specific amendment.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Nore. Before Senator Nore speaks the Chair is going to call to your attention again that we are on Final Reading. That requires the Senators to be in their own seats. Will you please take your seats. Even though we are debating a motion that relates to a bill on Final Reading. I would like to respectfully ask the Sergeant at Arms to please remind the Senators that we are on Final Reading. That means that the floor stays clear and the Senators stay in or at least in the proximity of their seats. You have asked me repeatedly to enforce the rules of this legislature, if you want me to do that, then you are going to have to at least cooperate. Now Senator Nore has the floor. The motion before us is to return LB827 to Select File for specific amendment by Senator Moylan which would clarify the penalty section. Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, members, I rise in support of Senator Moylan. For one reason that his judgment has always been in the last 10 years has been very, very sound and I am not an expert on bicycles but I am willing to take his advice.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I have one last question of Senator Moylan if he would yield. Senator Moylan, if you would look into that south balcony and see those young people up there, are you going to tell them that if they don't have reflectorized tape on their bicycles, they can end up with a traffic violation with a fine a monetary fine or also maybe out on work-release.

SENATOR MOYLAN: Mr. Senator Barnett, you may be the first one that is brought in on this traffic infraction, not those young people up there. I have confidence in those people that they will abide by the law. I'm not putting it upon the young people.

PRESIDENT: Alright, Speaker Proud.

SPEAKER: Mr. President, I don't think that Senator Moylan is entirely wrong, nor do I think that Senator Chambers is entirely wrong, but I am going to vote against returning it just for one reason which may be good or bad. There is such thing as the police doing some things that they shouldn't
