

SENATOR STAHLER: I'm not sure that you understand. But I think that I do and I am speaking against taking this... amendment off, that was adopted previously.

PRESIDENT: OK, fine

SENATOR STAHLER: I think that it allows both boards to exist until the Governor appoints a new one and then that at that specific date the new board takes over. I think that you are in a legal swamp if you do it otherwise. I would question whether the Attorney General would what he would have to say about it. I can't picture that to change from what was already adopted. I think that this is perfectly legal and that it is the only feasible thing to do.

PRESIDENT: Alright, Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Mr. President, I want to ask Senator Warner a question. Now on this the way the bill, or the way the committee amendment was, we have two committee or two things that we are considering, is that correct? One to change the name and the other who is the governing board.

SENATOR WARNER: In the interim period.

SENATOR PROUD: That is two separate questions, right? That are being considered in one amendment. Now do you have any objections to me asking for a division of the question? I it seems...I'm not trying to get in your way at all, but it seems to me that these are two separate and distinct things that people might vote different ways depending on whether the question is divided or not.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Proud, my only purpose is to try and get the bill the committee amendment considered as it came out of the committee exactly. These two changes were changes that were made after the bill left committee. It was my understanding that the name change was in concurrence with at least 5 members of the committee. The change in the two boards was done down in bill drafting and staff and I was aware of it. I made the assumption that this is was something that was also concurred, and I was in error on that part. All I'm trying to do is to get the committee amendments adopted as they were and then we can go back and make the same identical amendments back again.

SENATOR PROUD: I'm...myself I am not going to call for the division of the question. If somebody wants to that is their business.

PRESIDENT: Alright, Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, members of the legislature, I would just say that if there was a problem in the committee amendments as adopted, I think that we should now, we shouldn't have any debate. We should just take this back and take those amendments off. The the committee amendments could then as properly coming out of the committee will be before us and if they wish to amend them with the present ones in the book they can do it and properly so, but we are arguing about the wrong thing. We are just talking about an improper action from the committee and I think that we just ought to vote to reject these and start over.
