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request of the Committee on Committees. That is all that I have requested of them to do, to inquire of the lobbyist. I know in my personal conversations with the lobbyists since I introduced this bill, and I've talked to a great many of them, that they all have, almost without exception, varying interpretations of what kinds of things are reportable and the manner in which they shall report them. So, I think that the law that is presently administered does not function at all. It is the responsibility of the Committee on Committees to see that that law does function correctly, equitably and uniformly. That is the entire extent of my participation in this matter. I have made no accusations. If Senator Carpenter may recount any specific accusations that I have made or any accusation by innuendo other than the fact that the present law is not administered correctly and uniformly among the lobbyists. And that's my explanation for what's transpired up to date. I intend to raise my bill on the floor or attempt to raise my lobby bill on this floor in order that we may by statute clarify the provisions of what the law requires. That is the other aspect of my activities regarding the lobbyists and that is the total and complete extent of it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore, did you wish to speak on a point of personal privilege? It's the Chair's observation that if this matter is going to be raised through an attempt to raise this bill that there will be an attempt to discuss the matter at full length. But if you have something additional and.....

SENATOR NORE: I just wanted to clarify, Mr. Chairman, and members.....

PRESIDENT: You're speaking on a point of personal privilege?

SENATOR NORE: Yes, and Senator Whitney's.....

PRESIDENT: State your point, Senator.

SENATOR NORE: Senator Whitney's explanation that when he talks about law, it's a law that pertains to the lobbyists. He doesn't say, he didn't, he just says laws and I'm afraid some of our folks probably on....in the galleries and some on TV might get the wrong interpretation and that they were interpreting the law to us. But it's a law concerning lobbyists. And then I would like to say that I, I rather support....I support Senator Cavanaugh. The lobbyists....I've been here 10 years and they've all been very high class people and I have never been offered any money while here. I have been offered money in my campaigns but I never accepted a dime. And what has been mailed to me or given to me, I've returned it. So I think we're running a pretty tight ship on....but we do....we do need to continue to...to update the surveillance of the lobbyists no matter how good they are.

CLERK: Mr. President, we have some reports.

PRESIDENT: Yes, I think one more...Senator Chambers, did you still wish to speak on a point of personal privilege?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, Mr. President, a point of personal privilege, and I must speak this morning. I was going to let it go by but I cannot.

PRESIDENT: State your point, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: First of all, Senator Cavanaugh, he's a young man. I once was young. Senator Cavanaugh, be strong, stick by your guns and keep the faith. I do hear impassioned
