

SENATOR MOYLAN: Mr. President, would Senator Dickinson yield to a question? Senator Dickinson, did Sarpy county want an amendment on this? Maybe Senator Keyes could answer it better.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. President, there is the amendment it is in the line before this, and I presume that it is legal. It is in the amendment. It is for Civil Defense warning system and it is in the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: I wonder if I could ask Senator Kremer a question, and then maybe Senator Dickinson could answer the same thing. On the committee amendments, where it says a city of a metropolitan or primary class, if I would request that you would strike out or primary, would this be the proper place to Lincoln or to take Lincoln out of the bill?

SENATOR KREMER: In my opinion, it would.

SENATOR BARNETT: Senator Dickinson, do you agree?

SENATOR DICKINSON: I suspect that it would, do you think that Lincoln, or that....

SENATOR BARNETT: I know that they want out. That is why I am offering or asking the question if this is the right place? I would like to offer that for an amendment then that we strike or primary in the committee amendments then we will get out of your way. I'll write it up.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion of the Barnett amendment to the committee amendments, to strike the word primary or primary in line five of the committee amendment number one. Is there a second to his motion? Are you ready to vote? Have a voice vote. Those in favor of the Barnett amendment say aye, those opposed say no. Amendment carries. Now back to the committee amendment. Any further discussion on the committee amendment? This is on 757. The question has been called for. Those in favor of the committee amendments say aye, those opposed say no. Committee amendments are adopted. We are back to the.... are there further committee amendments? Mr. Clerk? Are there further amendments?

CLERK: No.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dickinson, do you wish to explain the bill.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Mr. President, 757 allows two or more sanitary improvement districts to join together with their resources to make improvements any improvements that are now allowed for them to make such as swimming pools, recreational facilities or any thing that a sanitary improvement district might do. There were no opponents I don't believe to the bill. This was requested by both sanitary improvement districts in Douglas County and by the city of Omaha in many cases, or most of these cases eventually most of them, not all of them however, most of them do inherit these areas after four or five years or after they are fairly well developed and then they come responsible for maintaining staffing and so forth as a community swimming pool. In some instances rather small districts have made these improvements and it has later turned out to be quite efficient. They have to be maintained by the city or by the district and it seems the desires of these people that they can join together
