

which now has to be in a will. Such things as the Wedgewood Tea Pot or the certain books or certain things in the house, household goods, these things would not have to be put in the will and that is one of the most difficult jobs that a lawyer has to draft wills is to draft all of those individual things in. Now you can just attach a list, a letter, attach it to the will and say, I want these things to go to so and so. By the way sometimes it is being done now, but it is not being done according to the law. There are many, many others which our objectives.....which I have outlined in my memorandum which you have in your hands which we will be glad to answer questions on as we get into the debate. I think that I have probably consumed more than my 10 minutes.

PRESIDENT: The introduction remarks of LB354 presented by Senator Luedtke and the Chair is going to next call upon Senator Carstens for his remarks. I assume that they will be on 755 for the most part. Before we do that Senator Carstens, if I may introduce two students from Israel who are seated under the south balcony today, visiting the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature. Will they please stand and be recognized? We are glad to have you with us today. Now would Senator Carstens.....

SENATOR CARSTENS: Mr. President, I don't want to get involved in a misunderstanding here, but I think that we take 354 and then 755, isn't it? So we don't then get them mixed up.

PRESIDENT: I'm sorry, it was my understanding that we were going to discuss them together, but if that is the desire we will stay on 354 and you may continue.

SENATOR CARSTENS: Where are we.....Is this the time for questions, or is this the time for statements or where are we now?

PRESIDENT: It is time for both.

SENATOR CARSTENS: I would like to very briefly like to make some references to what Senator Luedtke has said and then I would like to ask him some questions. In the brochure that he put out last night, on the bottom of the page and on the front page, and first I didn't think that Senator Luedtke had written this but I see he signed it, he states that I know you will not allow any diversionary proposals presented by special interests and obscure Nebraska's greatest need and so on. I want the people of this state and I want them and I want Senator Luedtke and I want the members of the legislature to know that I don't represent any special interests in this case. I don't represent any special interest in 354, and I don't represent special interests on 755. I represent one constituency and that is the people of the state of Nebraska. I'm not for or against anything I'm just interested in the merits of something and what it will and what it will not do for a bill. Will or will not do on the issues for the people of this state. Now I'm talking about special interests, I have been impressed. Years ago I read about the old "Loan Shark Bill" the lobbying that went on on the floor and the corridors of this capitol on the Loan Shark Bill. I have seen in the past few years or days the most intensive lobbying campaign I have ever seen in this capitol since I have been here in the 10 years that I have been here. That lobbying campaign has been carried on almost entirely by certain elements that I feel are interested in this bill for their own reasons. Much as the press association
