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more time after they go along, let's grant it but they give the full authority to talk as long as you could, we won't get out of here in order to adjourn sine die in the next 20 days. Now this is a bill, if I can proceed a minute, 75 members here and every member here including myself don't understand the damn thing. You can talk all day and all year and all month, we won't understand a thing more. This is a battle of lawyers for whatever the reason might be. There is some exceptions as to Senator Duis. We heard the bill in committee and I am certainly the last one in the world that would want to limit debate but I don't think that we just ought to open it up forever, I would think that if Senator Carstens wants ten minutes, give him ten minutes more or whatever is necessary in order to carry the continuity the Chair could use this discretion by not keeping a stop watch so to speak, the Chair has all the authority that he wants to and I think that in this case, he ought to exercise good judgement which I think that is what it would be. If they are in the middle of a thesis so to speak, on an important subject don't call time on them, let them finish it out then let them ask for more time. I would be opposed to just giving everybody time if they want it.

PRESIDENT: Well if I may just give a brief explanation? I can see that these gentlemen could debate this for an extensive amount of time and I was just hopeful that we could get 354 settled here this morning before lunch time that is all that I tried to do was to push the issue in that respect, but I do not want to be unfair to the principal introducer of this legislation. The motion is by Senator Syas to suspend the rules.

SENATOR SYAS: Senator Duis one of these bills explained section by section. I think that on the importance of these two bills because that we should have some leeway on debate and some freedom other than the usual manner. If the Chair is willing to allow the people that debate ask for extended time, I will withdraw my suspension of the rules but we may not understand it, but some of us are trying and I know that Senator Duis has a few things that he wants to go into section by section and I would like to hear what this is all about. I will withdraw my motion but I do hope that the people that do want an extended time will ask for it and I will be one of them that will give it to them.

PRESIDENT: Alright, the motion is withdrawn. So we really have nothing before the house except the bill but we will go ahead here because there are those who have input. Senator Carpenter do you have something else?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Just a brief statement. The ten minutes rule was passed for my exclusive benefit. You know what I found out in this body. If you can't say it in five minutes you had better keep your seat because you are losing ground for every minute that you proceed beyond that. Now you can talk a bill to death and many times we do that but we believe in brevity in this body and we ought to practice it.

PRESIDENT: Alright Senator Cal Carsten is next to speak and then Senator Duis.

SENATOR CAL CARSTEN: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, a point of personal privilege, I wonder if I could ask Senator Luedtke a question?

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke would you yield?

SENATOR CAL CARSTEN: Senator Luedtke, I know that you have had a series of briefings on this bill, night sessions, and I am wondering if all of the senators did attend those briefings? Were all the senators there?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: No unfortunately not all of them were able to make it
