I certainly hope that takes place in this particular bill because I don't want to get over to Select File with this type of legislation and find out we've got to have a lot of amendments and that we have a lot of correspondence and discussion. I wanted to make the Rules Committee chairman's position noticed to you so you will all be of due notice and at any time any of you want to stop this thing and go section by section at a time, this is in the rules.

PRESIDENT: All right, the Chair is going to make a couple of introductions at this time. First of all, 12 Extension Board members from Washington County, Tom (I believe it's) Lacey, the County Agent, Senator Blair Richendifer's district. They are in the north balcony. Also, 29 senior students here this morning visiting the Unicameral, also in the north balcony, Senator Hasebroock's district, from Leigh High School with their teacher, Joe Hoppes. We welcome you. The issue under discussion is a 300-section bill dealing with the State Probation Code. Now, there really is nothing before the House except General File debate on LB354. The Chair is going to state that I am going to allow some leeway on the part of the two principal introducers, Senator Carstens and Senator Luedtke. Other than that I certainly would hold in strict accordance to the rules on the 10-minute limitation for other members. But I think that these two gentlemen certainly have had the most input in the construction of LB354 and LB755. Now, there is nothing under discussion at this time so far as suspension of the rules but Senator Nore, I will recognize you for what purpose?

SENATOR NORE: I would like to say something in relationship with LB354, is that okay? Is that germane?

PRESIDENT: I'm going to.....
