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with the problem. I would suggest to all the members of this Legislature that this is not just a fight between lawyers nor is this a fight that it will serve....for which it will serve any real purpose to go into a detailed section by section debate unless there are specific questions such as those Senator Carstens raised to Senator Luedtke. The rules provide for everybody to speak twice. If the Chair will allow anybody to extend that with questions, all of the subject matter that anybody wishes to discuss can be thoroughly discussed. It seems to me when all is said and done, very few if any of the members of this Body will be able to be expert on this bill. You will have to form your judgments in a large part on what people whose opinions you respect say about the bill and upon the debate itself and what you think is good and bad. I don't think you can go into this on a detailed....detail by detailed point by point and come out ahead. If you listen to the debate on the sections that are raised, you will begin to get a feeling of whether you think this bill will do more good or more harm. And it would seem to me that that's the basis upon which a proper decision should be made.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Fellman, now, we're back to the bill as it stands on General File with the amendments. I have this order. Senator Fellman, I assume that that was all you wanted to say, that you did not want to speak on the bill. All right. The next one would be Senator Nore, Senator DeCamp, Senator Stull, and Senator Syas, but....all right....now, Senator Nore, before you are recognized, I would like to ask Senator Carstens, is there any other remarks you want to make regarding LB354? I'm doing this really as a matter of kind of assuming that you're really kind of a co-sponsor for this legislation.

SENATOR CARSTENS: Mr. President, I have centered....I agree that this bill is complicated to the extent that it would take....what we really need and nobody pay attention to it... we should go...have a week on this but there are two or three sections in this bill that I'm trying to bring out that support my contention that this bill is primarily a creature established to promote and to inspire and to facilitate and to make a selling point for extensive creation of trust. And, also the matter under conservatorships and guardianship, the powers, the unlimited, unrestricted powers given to conservatorship and guardianship, and the incentive to create trust. This is what I was getting at when I...my questions were in it. Now, these are the things that I want to bring out. This backs up what I'm claiming is the reason for the intensive lobbying that's going on back there. These people are not out here to pass the time of day for their enjoyment. There's a purpose of it. Now, this...whenever, however this is done, it makes no difference to me. I'm not requesting a section by section reading but I do think some of these things ought to be brought up. I also know that others are interested. I don't want to hog the floor. Let others ask questions. And I want to reserve the right to ask later.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Carstens. Next, we will recognize Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. Chairman and members. First, I would like to congratulate Senator Luedtke and his committee. I think personally I attended their seminar and I was impressed but I have mixed emotions of whether I can support the bill. I said I support it but I don't think I can vote for it because I think you have a job to do before we pass this bill. And that is go out in the State of Nebraska and sell this bill and
