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less than that. It would less than \$10,000, it may be somewhere between five and eight thousand dollars of the cost. We are not offering any figures with this. If there isn't sufficient funds to the job the under the program or the budget we have now, I presume we could expect a heavy deficiency budget for that amount. But the amount would be minimal. It would be less than what we are spending now. And with the people in the state of Nebraska have been seeing, their Legislature in action for one full hour every evening, or approximately 25, 20 to 25% of the coverage of the time we spend here. I move for the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh, and then Senator Simpson.

SENATOR MARSH: I think probably we should wait until after we find out how many people are truly watching this program before we saddle them with the responsibility of programing for an hour. I can see many people, many teachers, many students making use of a concise half hour worth of programing. I also would like to remind the body that we start our session with just half day sessions in the morning and it might be very difficult to fill up an hour. Frankly, I find it refreshing to have some of the filibustering deleted from the TV program. I feel that they have done a tremendous job, by and large using their time well. There is nothing that says that if there is something specific they want to put on for an additional time, they could not choose to do so. I would not favor demanding that they use an hour of TV time for us.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simpson, I though you strategically withdrew there for a moment.

SENATOR SIMPSON: No I'm not. Never. Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I to would oppose that we should put in that they should specifically do an hour program. I have looked at the program some evenings when they though that it was in the interest of the people of Nebraska, they have extended the time to finish what would give the people a good idea, perhaps of what had gone on. Sometimes I've seen the program, and I thought the half hour was too long, but they didn't have enough to take out. And so I really think that if we leave it open, and they have the feeling that we would say yes if there is something of the public interest, you should extend the time and not hold it just to a half hour if it's possible within you timing for that evening that this could be done, but not to specifically say, you have to go for one hour. There could be times even again when that time should be extended. But you know you take people, looking at a program and this in watching it mayself gets a little dry sometimes. You can't expect them to sit there and try to digest a whole hour in one session.

PRESIDENT: Sometimes 10 minutes is too long. I will have to refrain from my comments. The order is Murphy, Burbach, Cavanaugh, Carstens, and Stahmer.
