starting to be concerned with propaganda, and not improperly perhaps even, but when it gets over to that side of the line rather than on the education, because we are concerned, or we want to direct what is done it appears to me that, at least my concern is that at least this kind of a motion is just another step toward attempting to give additional direction to what ETV has covered. I think ETV programs are good, I think it is essential that they have the ability to retain the objectivity within the limits that they can under their funding arrangement. But they have the freedom to choose as to that what they put on I would further suggest that the argument as to what length of time could well be resolved with the amendment I believe that was already adopted dealing with rating. We may find that that may have a total different impact upon the value of the program in term of the number of people who are watching it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Fellman.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I would like to rise to compliment the educational television network. And Mr. Fowler and his staff. In listening to this debate today and the other day, it seems to me that it's amazing that they have done through almost two sessions and only really had one debate the question as to whether they were editing the show correctly. I think they have done an outstanding job, though I personally would state that there have been many times that I thought that I should have been on the show because I said something of magnificent importance, that was cut out. I think that by and large with those exceptions they have done an excellent job. Further I would suggest that they have from time to time added an extra half an hour as they should be able to. It seems to me we shouldn't regulate this at all. They have a good track record. If any of you would go through the facility as I did the other night, I think you would be highly impressed with the facilities as well, as the product that you see on television. I think it would be altogether wrong for us to try to control in any way their handling of this program. They have been running it for half an hour. I as I think all of have been pleasantly surprised by the large number of people who have told me they watched the show, in preference to some of the late night shows that are available at the same time. We performed better than Johnny Carson, many people have told me, and I think that's due in large part to their editing. I would not like to see that changed, or see us doctor it up in any way. I would think that we should defeat this and wait for the rating, and see what happens.

PRESIDENT: Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, I'll be very brief. I don't think that this program has very high priority on the educational TV because they put it on at night after everybody has gone to bed. Excepting those who perhaps aren't working very hard the next day. And so I feel that if we are going to do anything, let's have this on the program in the day time so that at least the elderly people can have a chance to see it in their homes. And nursing homes. And let's put it on earlier at night. I think there is where the focus of attention should be. And if necessary I would like to move the previous question here. Is it necessary?
