SENATOR FELLMAN: Would you support an amendment to have this to exempt contributions of \$100.

SENATOR BARNETT: I certainly would.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Would Senator Syas yield.

PRESIDENT: Senator Syas yield.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Would support an amendment to exempt cash contributions, except under a \$100. And that would have the affect of requiring anything under \$100 or....

SENATOR SYAS: I possibly would go for the \$100. Anything above \$100. Let's not have these 99 and .99 cent checks.

SENATOR FELLMAN: But it has to be some place, and...

SENATOR SYAS: \$100 is...

SENATOR FELLMAN: \$100 is where it would have to be in check or money order..I \$100

SENATOR SYAS: Above \$100.

SENATOR FELLMAN: That means you could carry a ...with \$100 bill would be alright.

SENATOR SYAS: Yes, I might buy that, if anybody contributes over \$100, they would have to do it by check.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Senator Carpenter would you yield to a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter yield.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Would you support an amendment to this bill.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I would support nothing above \$20.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Pardon.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I would support nothing except nothing above the rules of \$20. If you want to put \$100 you might as well kill the bill.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Well, don't you feel that many small tickets are sold.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Small tickets. If a man is going to give \$100 let him give a check.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Well, I favor the...Thank you, Senator. Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. If it is an order now, I would offer an amendment. And I will write it out in a minute. To..

PRESIDENT: It wouldn't be in order unless Senator Barnett wants to withdraw his motion. His takes precedent at this particular time, if he wants to withdraw in order with an understanding with you that you offer a specific amendment, fine. Then we can bring the bill back for specific amendment and that would be all.
