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and does a very good job of representing them. And he does it this morning. I must say to Senator Warner that the first statement he made, the letter which came from Omaha was not a lie, was not a lie. That was taken in seven days in a sport show that just ended in which people from all over the State of Nebraska drove into Omaha and attended this sport show. And as they passed this sports booth, they were asked to fill out a certain form, and these people came from Hartington, I was there. They came from all over the state. They came from the middle of the state, and the southeastern part of the state, and they were asked specifically if they were farmers before they were even asked to participate in the poll. So Senator Warner, it was not a lie. This was a duly constituted poll that was taken by sports clubs at a very large attendance in the Omaha Sports Vacation Shows, that was held in our city. Senator Warner, you are correct when you talk about ditches. And this is all it amounts to. Also, Senator Warner, they will be no more problems in this than has been taking place in the last years. Cars still see pheasants and game and in the last years and years leading up to right now, they do stop, and they stop suddenly, because it shows the fact that there is birds in this area. This law isn't going to change that any. Senator Warner, for your information this particular bill has been law in the states of Iowa, which has small farms. It has been law in the farming state of Minnesota. And has been very successful. It has not caused these accident, car accident related problems that you have come up with this morning, in your asking that the bill be taken back. It has been the public relations factor in those two states between farmer and hunter in which were there is not the pestering and bothering of the particular land owner. And particularly also, Senator Warner, you should know that it is 200 yars between any dwelling place before a person can hunt in these ditches. And so I ask the Legislature this morning, as this bill has taken it's place over the Final Reading, and this is the second attempt of Senator Warner's to take the bill back and to kill it, that this bill does work in other farm states. Iowa, Minnesota. It has not caused the problems. It has been on their books for some twenty years. And I can see no problem where this particular law into our statutes will cause the problems that Senator Warner sees this morning.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes, Senator Richard Lewis.

SENATOR RICHARD LEWIS: Well, Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. I rise to support Senator Warner in this move. This is one of the real sore points with land owners in my area, and I'm sure it is throughout the state. I..I'm not sure about the relationship in other states, because I don't hunt there, but this is a thing that happens constantly in the rural areas of Nebraska, especially my part of the state, and that is roadside hunters, they drive..they just patrol the areas, and their abusing the law now, and that they when they are far enough away from the general highways that they carry loaded shotguns, they fire from the roadbed itself. And I think this would only cause a worsening of relationship between the hunters and the land owners.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Mahoney. Excuse me, Senator Wiltse. Excuse me, Senator Mahoney, Senator Wiltse hasn't spoken yet. Senator Wiltse.
