SENATOR CARPENTER: I move the previous question, we'll spend all day talking about this thing. Let's try this. I don't know if it's going to work or not. If it don't work, let's change it tomorrow. But let's do something now.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Goodrich, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR GOODRICH: According to the Clerk, would the Clerk yield to a question? Is it your understanding, Vince, that this would start tomorrow morning or tomorrow afternoon?

CLERK: I'm not sure I have a clear understanding on that.

PRESIDENT: Under the Carpenter proposal, it would be that the separate column on General File be taken up tomorrow morning, it's the Chair's understanding, the first thing before General File. In other words, this special list of bills would precede any general file consideration. This would be the special General File list.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Which is being made up?

PRESIDENT: Which is being made up today, that is correct. And that would be the first thing considered then beginning tomorrow morning.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Except that we've got 3 bills that are already bracketed for General File debate tomorrow morning and I would amend...propose an amendment to take this up after those 3 bills are taken up.

PRESIDENT: I would think that would take some precedence because they've already been set for hearing and the Chair would allow that at least at this moment until somebody wants to overrule the Chair. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I presume that the Senator is talking about LB656, is that the bill?

PRESIDENT: Three of them, LB302, LB656, and (inaudible), yes, sir.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I'm just talking about the one he's interested in.

SENATOR GOODRICH: That's the three.

SENATOR CARPENTER: All right, if you'll run right up there, it'll be the first thing tomorrow morning. Put your name and make that your first choice. I have no objection to that. I think we ought to discuss this.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Duis, do you want to go back and discuss this any further. Senator Duis, Duis, do you want to discuss the Carpenter motion any more.

SENATOR DUIS: I merely wanted to make a point of the fact that the Speaker has the right to set the...now, Senator Proud, did you wish the motion in place of your declaration?

PRESIDENT: Now, Speaker Proud, please give the Chair....
