

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Skarda, and then Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR SKARDA: Direct a question to Senator Kennedy. You emphasize so emphatic that this caused some discouragement with reference to the hunter and the fireman and I'm going to ask this question of him. I don't hear of any dissatisfaction in Iowa or in the states that would adopt the procedure it is a common well accepted practice. As a matter of fact it has created better relations in the state that have it than our own state. We are consistently and constantly confronted with this problem that we are faced with today and I think that we ought to resolve it. There is thousands and thousands of acres that would be made accessible to the hunter that enjoys hunting and pays the license of the state and I don't why he should be denied any more than the person living in Iowa, South Dakota or any of the adjoining states where they have this privilege.

SENATOR KENNEDY: I think that probably if you would have the abuse that some of the farmers have had, and we have tried, and I think again that it is our obligation and I am sure that it is true in many communities that the hunting clubs are inviting some of the farmers into some of the meetings. The communication is in an effort to get a better relationship and sure, it might be the same as writing checks. One bad check is going to make you feel that all checks are bad and this is probably true of the hunters. I know that we have had a lot of hunters on our farm that have been real good, but I can not speak for the other states, maybe there communication has been better. All I can speak for is the fellows that I have visited with.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, I haven't heard from anybody direct or indirectly opposed to this bill. I come from a district a that is basically agricultural and I go home every week end Friday, Saturday and Sunday and I haven't had a single complaint or a single contact direct or otherwise from anybody who is opposed to this bill. Now the Senator who has had contact I would hope that they would get to the feet and tell us how much opposition that you have had from your constituents and how many and what the reaction was. I don't think that there is any reaction against this bill. Any senator who has had any reaction against this bill, I hope that he would come to his feet and say so.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, fellow members, I wasn't here yesterday, but I did watch the program last night and I thought that yo spend an awful lot of time on such trivial matters as this. It must be political to a certain degree, now we have quite a bit of land, and I welcome people to hunt our land. I like to see them come, we like company and
