are telling them. They haven't even been listening to you. This is probably one of the most important bills dealing with the public utilities. If you look up there you will see the watch dogs who are up there. And you will see that they are pretty well apart from each other. Because they don't want to get close to each other. Now we had a meeting last night, which I don't want to go into now. I just want to alert SENator Goodrich now. I want to put these in the Journal, I want to hold this over until tomorrow. I'm not trying to delay your bill. When the legislation makes determination if my amendments I'm through with this. Whether they adopt them or in whole or whether they don't. I want them to understand better than they do now what's in this bill. Senator Schmit also has his amendments which he can explain himself. But I ask unanimous consent that they amendments be printed in the Journal, and the bill be held on General File until tomorr ow.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I would agree with that. I will concur with that, Senator Carpenter, on one condition and that is that Senator Schmit amendments also get printed so that we can decide both of them tomorrow, and if there are any other amendments, we want them printed now, so that we can just make the decision tomorrow.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Senator Schmit can talk for himself.

PRESIDENT: Do you concur, Senator Schmit.

SENA TOR SCHMIT: Well I would just like to say, Mr. President that I will not be here tomorrow, or the next day, and of co urse Friday is a poor day. I would suggest that they would have to hold the bill over until Monday. I would agree to that but I could not be here tomorrow. And I would..

SENATOR GOODRICH: Why don't we take up your amendment right now?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well, as Senator Carpenter has said I don't think you have explained your bill. But I am willing to do whatev er you want to do.

PRESIDENT: Well, the motion before us is a unanimous consent to print the amendments in the Journal, and then Senator Goodrich has amended that to include Senator Schmit's amendments. And therefore there is where the chair is at this time. That the bill be held over. Senator Duis for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I think probably that I would inject a thought here if I might, and ~~that~~ is the printing in the Journal is fine. Now all we have ao far is just Senator Schmit's amendments, and we have Senator Carpenter's amendments. But we also have an amendment by Senator Goodrich, if I am correct in wh~~at~~ I'm hearing. I would suggest that in this unanimous consent motion, and I'm speaking to Senator Carpenter, if I can get his attention in just a moment. Senator Carpenter would you include in your unanimous consent motion of printing these in the Journal that the Clerk be instructed to have copies m ade of these amendments and put on each one's desks.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Certainly, Certainly.
