called the REA amendment. It was given to me by NPPD but the REA's take credit for the drafting of that amendment. What that amendment does, and I can tell you briefly what it does.

PRESIDENT: A motion under...I'm sorry Senator Goodrich. The motion under debate here is to bracket until Monday. It doesn't have anything to do with any amendments at this particular time. And the motion to amend, etc. is the lower priority than the motion to postpone to a time certain. Senator Kremer. The motion is to bracekt this bill until Monday.

SENATOR KREMER: That's right, Mr. Chairman I wish to support the motion, I'll tell you why. Some of that are in this room that were here in the early 60's. There was some blood letting then. We were in a state of confusion at that time, and to move now without all of us being properly informed, is what we are doing, I think we would be foolhardy. I think we should wait until the next session to pass legislation. I think the most courteous thing we could do is to bracket this bill, at least until Monday and give all of us the time to look at all the amendments that have been offered. Some of them are quite far reaching, and they have bearing on rates, they have bearing on wheeling, and we need to pay close attention. I just support the motion to bracket the bill until next week.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well, Mr. President, I support the motion. I think I don't need to explain to anyone here, that I am no power expert. I have an amendment on the bill, but I certainly need plenty of time to see what these other amendments do to the bill, and therefore I would support Senator Duis' motion to bracket the bill.

PRESIDENT: We are debating the issue to bracket the bill. Senator Carpenter. And then Senator Nore.

SENATOR CARPENTER: This is an old trick of the publically owned utilities. Expedite. Really what they want to do, they don't want any bill passed. They want the status quo. And that's the one thing this body should not permit them to do. You can take all these amendments, and then you divide the amendments between who? Between the Nebraska Public Power and the Rural's on one hand. In the other hand you have the Omaha Public Power District and the City of Lincoln. And they are both fighting and cutting each other up. But what they want to do, they want to have no bill. They want a bill with any amendments or anything else. They want to be left alone, so they can operated like they have operated for forty or fifty years. That's the play here. Senator Goodrich is only the quarterback. He doesn't have a hold of the ball. So I move that we print all the amendments in the Journal of all the people here, and then discuss them next Monday, if it's convenient.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Duis do you want to expand your motion to braceket the bill and print all the amendments.

SENATOR DUIS: Yes, I would amend my motion then, if it's possible. Or do you want to act on the amendment to the motion first, or do you want me to amend the entire motion?
