PRESIDENT: It makes no difference to the Chair.

SENATOR DUIS: I move that all the amendments to LB656 be printed in the Journal, and that the bill be bracketed until next Monday.

PRESIDENT: Now you have heard the motion before the body. Senator Goodrich, do you want to be heard on the motion?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes, I have no objection to...I will concede to hold it until Monday. However, first I want to make sure of two things. Number one, that each person that puts amendments on gets identified in the Journal as who the amendment comes from, and then also I want to be sure that we don't get lost in the storm Monday. I want to be sure we take it up first thing Monday morning.

PRESIDENT: All right, stand by for just a minute. Senator Carpenter for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well I would like to say that Senator Goodrich, I hope that he will put in the Journal where he got the amendments, and who gave them to him and what the purpose are. That's the whole question. It really alerts this body that you are doing a lot of the finagling for the people that want to do something through you. And by your explanation previous to this time you have almost proven you didn't know what you are talking about.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, let's clarify something. Is it the Chair's understanding that you wanted the source of the amendments by votes, is that...

SENATOR GOODRICH: No, just the Senator's name so that we know for example, if there is anyone other than Schmit, and Carpenter who have got amendments, we want to know about it.

PRESIDENT: That's what's going to happen anyway, and it usually does. Now, Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, and members I favor setting this date to a time certain Monday morning, for one reason we've had peace in the Public Power Districts for the last three years, and I sometimes think of the story that Senator Carstens told the other day when we was on the probate bill. That a lawyer's dream is having an oil well real deep, and if I don't tell this right Senator Carstens, you will correct me, and a gusher lined with law suits, and this is what liable to end up if we don't do this thing very carefully. I'd like to see the peace and tranquility we've had the last three years, in the power field.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to have all the amendments printed and bracketed...the bill bracketed until Monday. Now, Senator Hasebroock did you want to be heard on the issue. Stand by, Senator...

SENATOR HASEBROOCK: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. I just rise in support of the motion to bracket the bill until Monday.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Stull.
