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A bills, any appropriation of money and he's telling the truth and for that, I admire him for it. Now, if you want that kind of restriction on you in the area which we operate and assume your responsibility this is the best way to do it. The rule's a lousy rule insofar as the independents of the Legislature are concerned. We have people who want to have a sifting committee. They want to determine even what bills can be introduced. What gives them any God-given right or judgment to tell anyone else what they ought to introduce or what they ought to sponsor? And those for the most part who offer these things are the most ineffective members of this Legislature. They're really opposed to anything and they'd like to have the Legislature come to adjourn the minute we get here because they're afraid of progress. They're afraid of anything. They're even afraid of themselves. And to give this power to the Appropriations Committee is just completely asinine, ridiculous and you'll live, the day will haunt you until you leave here. And it'll certainly haunt me for the next 14 days.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Carpenter, we have a problem because your motion....your motion, Senator Carpenter, your motion.....

to indefinitely postpone does not yield and the motion to amend does not, they do not yield to each other under the rules of the Legislature so I can't accept your motion to indefinitely postpone. We're back to the amendment and that's before us at this time and I'll have to have because Senator Duis made the motion, I'll have to have his motion or concurrence to withdraw. Sir.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: I received the idea of the amendment from Senator Carpenter. Senator Carpenter is opposed to the idea which he gave me so I ask unanimous consent that we'll go back to Senator Johnson's previous rule change which is the rule change that Senator Carpenter says that he favors and that is all bills. So, we are...I ask unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment I made for Senator Carpenter so that we may vote on the rule as it originally was and will apply to all bills of appropriation, thank you.

PRESIDENT: So ordered then. Now, the amendment is withdrawn. We hadn't voted on it so there's no reason why it couldn't be withdrawn. We're back now to the original rule change. Does anybody else now want to discuss the original rule change which was proposed by Senator Johnson and is found on page 876 of the Journal? Senator...wait a minute, Senator Chambers I believe was on first, then Senator Stahmer, then Waldron. Senator Chambers. Now, we're speaking on the original rule change.
