We should not play with the feelings of people who think that this bill is going to continue to stay passed as we pass it and reap the benefits from it. We should not bring the bill back.

PRESIDENT: Speaker Proud is next to talk.

SPEAKER PROUD: Mr. President, when this bill was voted on you may or may not recall this but I asked some questions about it and a I asked them in good faith because I like Senator DeCamp was rather appalled by the gravity of the bill, and what it does. Now, when all of the confusion was a over, I did vote for the bill. I think that contrary to what Senator Lewis said, I think that Senator DeCAMP gave one of the finest speeches that I have heard down here, including my own. Senator Murphy made a comment when this bill was under consideration which I think deserves more emphasis and I believe to paraphrase him, he said that he would be in favor of giving ADC mothers more money so that they could stay home rather than creating these day care centers which gets them out of the home. I happen to believe that when a family has small children it is better for the mother to be in the home, if possible. However there are conditions we know, where the mother has to go out and work. I am not convinced at all that this should be encouraged by the state. As Senator DeCamp has pointed out the Federal Government is dangling three million dollars and we just can't wait to get at it. So, in closing I would say that there is nothing what-so-ever to bringing this bill back and taking another look at it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Waldron, Nore, Schmit, Kelly, Dickinson.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, members of the legislature, reluctantly stand up and oppose bringing this bill back, I say reluctantly, I am opposed to bringing this bill back but I am in favor of its continued passage. The thing of it is we are taking up unnecessary time, I believe that we have made a decision. As I pointed out once before in this session this is what we are going to continue to do. Everyday rediscuss bills that have already been decided, then what we should do is adjourn now, call a special session to handle the budget bills and call it quits there. It can easily be seen that we are not going to accomplish any more this session if we don't get on with our work. Now, Senator DeCamp, is just frankly way off base on this, and this year he seems to be getting further and further off what you would consider the good track of good legislation, and I really can't understand it.
