CLERK: It is unanimous consent.

SENATOR DUIS: I don't believe that is possible because a bill unbracketed I believe goes to the bottom of General File and I think that it would take a vote or a motion to bring it from the bottom to the top because if that was the case, anyone like I had a bill over on bracket would try and bring it over by unanimous consent and place it someplace on General File. SENATOR DE CAMP: Mr. President, I apologize, is this my bill? Oh, fine.

PRESIDENT: Senator Waldron do you want to put this in one motion or two motions now?

SENATOR WALDRON: No, one is plenty.

PRESIDENT: One is plenty?
