So I think we ought to get to what the real issue is which the lack of discipline within the Body and we should not put a Constitutional Amendment before the people to try to get us to do what we ought to do here. We can stop suspending the rules, we can cease bringing up issues that ought not be brought up and the only ways bills can continue to be introduced after the ten bill limit is for 30 members to go along with it. If we don't want these things, then we should stop doing them on the floor of the Legislature and not continue to clutter and make the Constitution something it ought not be. That is the document which is the fundamental law of the state and a lot of the things that are put into it by this Legislature by submitting them to a vote of the people ought not be there. I'm opposed to the principle of this resolution but whether you put it on General File or not doesn't make that much difference to me but I would object to its being put at the top of General File. I'll vote against putting it on General File. I'll vote against it should it come to a final vote after debate on General File if it ever reaches that point. But I think you ought to consider seriously the import of the resolution. Some of the people who are for going back to semi-annual sessions acknowledge that they won't even be here. The rest of us have a job to do and I think we're capable of doing it and you ought to consider again the possibility of an exercise facility for senators.

PRESIDENT: The Chair next recognizes Senator Cal Carsten and Senator Stahmer, I'm going to apologize to you but I did call on you and you were out of the chamber. Senator Cal Carsten.

SENATOR CAL CARSTEN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I realize this probably is an important issue but I think really our discussion should be held to whether we put it on General File without a hearing or whatever. The merits of the bill can be discussed when the proper time is there. I think we've all got input and I certainly have into this question. But now I don't think is the proper time to do it. But I think we'd better vote on the motion, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Johnson and then Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I voted against annual sessions when it was put before the people before but I don't think we should be putting these issues before the people every two or three years or four or five years. Senator Carpenter asked for a rule change and we adopted it limiting bills for each senator to ten. I think we can have rules, maybe cut that in two to five and I think we should make an effort to make this work before we ask for a change again.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, members of the Body. I would just like to second what Senators Chambers and Johnson have said and add additionally, I think it's extremely in this day and age with the fluctuation in the economy the way it is and taxation and everything else, I shudder to think what it would be like to budget for two years in advance when the information we get changes almost daily, almost weekly, and we sometimes criticize each other back and forth from the executive and legislative and back, etc. When in
